All in all 49 Gold, 37 Silver and 30 Bronze medals were won by our athletes.

David Carr honoured

At the AMA Awards dinner in Sydney, David Carr was inducted into the AMA Hall of Fame. He is the second inductee from WA after John Gilmour. Below is the speech given by Bob Schickert to honour David.

IMMEDIATELY after the 1987 WMA Championships in Melbourne Lynne and I were relocating from Melbourne to Perth and therefore took an interest in the results of athletes from Western Australia. David Carr was noticed by us when he won a silver medal in the M55 800m.

Over the years since I have been fortunate to witness some of David's outstanding performances which have resulted in his induction to the AMA Hall of Fame this year. His achievements since 1987 are mind boggling. David has won 14 gold six silver and four bronze at WMA Championships

In Porto Rico the 800m was a very tactical race. David ran 2:25.14 and Earl Fee an outstanding Canadian athlete and world record holder ran 2:26.09. After the race I was with some Americans and more arrived having missed the race. The new arrivals said "How much did Earl Fee win by – nobody beats Earl Fee". I was proudly able to advise them an Australian had just done that. The list goes on and keeps getting more outstanding.

Lahti 2009 M75 400m gold and 800m silver and David had also taken up a new event where he won the silver medal in the 2000m steeple.

Sacramento 2011 M75 (at 79 years of age of age) gold in the 800m and 2000m steeple, bronze in the 1500m.

Porto Alegre 2013 to cap all those medals David won four gold medals in the WMA Championships in M80 gold in the 400m, 800m, 1500m, 2000m steeple.

David had also been awarded several AMA National Championship Awards.

- Middle distance/steeple 2008 and 2013.
- Most outstanding male athlete 2004, 2010 and 2014.
- Most outstanding individual performance 2002 and 2009.
- Brian Foley Award best age graded performance 1500/800/ 2009.
- In 2011 David was nominated by Oceania Masters Athletics for the IAAF Masters Athlete of the Year Award.

There is nothing more I can add except extremely well done David. Thank you.

Chris wins jumps award


WA's Chris Anderson won the AMA Performance of the Year Award in the jumps catergory.

These awards are presented annually at the dinner function held at the end of season AMA Championships. The awards were based on athletic performances achieved during 2014 and the presentations were made during the Sydney Championships in April. The 2015 award recipients are listed below (from the AMA website).

Jumps: Chris has a long history of high jump behind him from his days in open competition Chris has now entered the M45 category and at the Athletics Western Australian Strive Meeting he set an Australian record of 1.90m.

Sprints/Hurdles: Gianna Mogentale W50 from NSW was in top form at the World Indoor Championships in Budapest winning a gold medal in the 400m, silver in the 60m and fourth place in the 200m. She set a new Australian record of 26.48s in the 200m and broke the 60m AR three times (8.40, 8.18, 8.17). Gianna won the Champion of Champions Sprint at the AMA Championships for the seventh consecutive year. Gianna excelled at the Oceania Masters, AMA Championships and PanPac Games with six gold medals at each.

Middle Distance: Jenny Flynn W60 from Qld won gold at the WMA Indoor Championships in the 800m (2.41.40)



and 1500m (5.47.05), setting Australian records in both. She also won the same two events at the Oceania Championships. At PanPac Jenny won gold in four track events including the 800m and 1500m with age grade performances all above 90%.

Distance: Janet Upcher W65 from Tasmania won the 5000m and 10,000m at the Tasmanian and AMA Championships in Hobart with best time is 22.43.75 (93.95%) and 46.08.23 (95.47%). Janet also had gold medal performances in the half marathon 1:44.37 (93.43%) and 8000m Road Championships 38.10 (90.10%).

Walking: Kelly Ruddick W40 from Victoria made quite an impact on world

records when she entered the W40 category in 2013. In 2014 Kelly broke her own world record by more than 10 seconds in the 5km with a time of 21.46.68. Kelly won the Victorian Open 5km and 10km events and finished second in the Open Roadwalk Championships in Hobart. She competed for Australia at the World Open Racewalking Cup in China in the 20km (1:34.00) and at the IAAF Challenge Series Event in Mexico where she finished seventh. In 2014 Kelly was the highest ranked Australian female walker in the IAAF rankings.

Throws: A very motivated Stuart Gyngell (NSW) entered the M50 age group. Within the first month of the year Stuart set five Australian records, three in shot put, two in discus and one in the throws pentathlon plus a world record in shot (18.63m). During the year Stuart increased his AR in discus two more times with a best of 51.09m.

Multi Events /Relays: Geoff Gibbons M35 from Tasmania put together an outstanding decathlon obtaining 6428 points. This was close to the Australian record that Geoff set several years ago when he was nearer the younger end of this age group.

Administrator / Official of the Year: Ian Mann from Queensland is one of those behind the scenes administrators who have been a stalwart of Queensland Masters competitions for many years.


























My Nationals

I WAS very excited to be running my second Nationals in Sydney as I'd never been before. The first day at the track was a wet one which, to be honest, I didn't mind as it reminded me of my younger years running in the UK in the rain. I started with the 60m to which I made the finals and a PB, a great warm up for the 800m! Although the 800m panned out differently to my plan, I had a great run, my favourite result from the Champs, and was super happy with a six second PB and finishing fifth.

Day two was still wet for the 200m and was lucky enough to gain a bronze and a season best time. The sun eventually shone for our third day, first up was the 400m, my second best run of the weekend, gaining

a much wanted PB and another fifth placing. We had great teamwork in the 4x100m where we achieved a new State record for WA and got a silver medal. I always love a relay! The sun was still out for the 400H and I ran for gold, although I do need a whole lot of work on my technique. I completed the competition on the Monday with the 8K Cross Country, running two 4K laps and a silver medal.

We finished the weekend off with a couple of days sightseeing in the city, which was great, especially as we kept bumping into familiar faces from the track in random places. Although the rain was back, I got my photos of Sydney Bridge and Opera House. Another box ticked.

I've loved watching the many talented athletes in Sydney and I'm proud to be a part of such a great team with so much inspiration! I've enjoyed making new friends as much as I've enjoyed competing. Team WA have some amazing athletes and everyone has had awesome results. I wish you all good luck in Lyon.

My Nationals

I DID not compete in the Nationals last year, so was looking forward to being involved in Sydney. I have a friend in Bankstown so that took care of accommodation, although relying on taxis proved a little difficult as some of the time they did not turn up and then some didn't know where the track. I collected my pack and registered on Thursday afternoon and the weather was fine and warm but a shower forecast for Friday. My first event being shot put at 3.50pm on Friday by which time the shower arrived and did not stop. I won the shot-put, so was happy with that, then went onto the hammer throw at 6.30pm which was a total disaster, put off by the rain and wet circle. I managed a silver medal, but considered it a poor performance for the amount of training I had put in.

Saturday we woke up to rain again which was heavier than Friday, first event was Javelin where I won a Silver medal behind Wilma Perkins. Later in the afternoon we were taken by bus to another athletic field in Lidcombe for discus, it was a quagmire, wading through mud to get to



the circle, the conditions affected everyone. I won the Gold medal but must admit the first two days were the worst conditions I have ever competed in.

Sunday dawned bright sunshine, everyone was in a much better frame of mind and we had the throws pentathlon which didn't go to badly until the last event – the Weight throw. I had two no throws which put me under pressure to ensure my last throw was legal, I think I suffered a panic attack but did manage to land it in the sector, this gave me the Gold medal and the National Championship record for the pentathlon.

Sunday night was the presentation dinner held at the Bankstown Sports Club, a very enjoyable night with great food. The highlight being Heather Doherty, Heather Carr and David Carr being inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Monday morning we woke up to thick fog, just to add another dimension to our weekend weather. I had the Weight throw first up and made no mistakes this time, still had a couple of no throws but three throws more than 11 metres – 11.71, 11.54, 11.38, my best effort for more than three years and the Gold medal. My last event was the Champion of Champions for Throws, this year being discus. This was won by my good friend Mary Thomas and well deserved.

I then had to get changed and head for the train station but was offered a lift to the airport by a NSW athlete. This got me to the airport early, which was closed temporarily due to a huge storm passing over, when checking in I was offered an earlier flight which got me home an hour earlier where it was also raining. I really enjoyed my nationals as you have the opportunity of catching up with friends from all over Australia and some from New Zealand.

The pole vault is a new event for me

meters for a record short time of one week earlier this year. I was absolutely thrilled to get over 2.40 meters and a state record and get another silver. One of the officials kept saying how ugly my style was, and I kept saying to myself, but the bar is still up there.

All in all a fantastic day, and I also got to meet some of the Australian and World Masters committee members who I deal with on Perth 2016.

It was also fantastic to see so many WA members over there, and the support they gave to each other and others was really something and I was proud to be part of the team, even if for such a short time.




