WORLD TRACK AND FIELD: DURBAN

The Champions: There are some brilliant athletes who are almost guaranteed medals before they hit the track. Derick Turnbull, who gave us a fine display in the 800 and 3000m in Perth won about everything from 800 to the marathon with two world records. Phil Raschker (W50) flitted from sprints to hurdles to jumps to relays, winning about eight gold medals and several world records. Irene Obera W60 won her sprints by huge margins.

The Pageant: The flags, the national costumes, the sponsor's signs, the starters on the line, and the grace and grunt of the field athletes all contribute to the theatre of a big meeting like this. The spectacle is exciting from the stands, but doubly so for the athletes in the arena looking up to crowded grandstands and hearing enthusiastic support for efforts. their Not all pageantry was athletics. hundred teenage students came during the relays to chant African rhythms, and the opening ceremony featured dancing and a historical tableau

(albeit curtailed by an empty fuel tank in the generator.)

The Bonds: Six thousand came with a common purpose: athletics. The sport is said to be the most selfish, yet we see friendships being formed and renewed. Here is a place where everyone cares about the other's training, effort and attainment. We are away from the blank stares, the barely tolerant, the slightly amused. There is a warmth in veteran athletics seldom seen in other pursuits.

The organisation: The host country was well prepared. It an enormous task to have severe venues operating, with all the personnel and equipment involved. After some minor problems in the first two days (long waits in the holding room, crowded buses) t' program ran smoothly. officials were generally qualified and helpful. With a few exceptions, results were displayed in reasonable time after the events. though some athletes inconvenienced by not knowing whether they had qualified for the next round. There were two stadiums, each with good synthetic surfaces amd we;; set up sites for field events. Outside there was a grassed throwers' stadium which was adequate but really a training facility. Equipment was in good condition and delivered on tim There were lap-counting errors in spite of individual lap counters. Errors seemed to be caused by athletes over-riding the lap casting doubt, counter. then sprinting home on lap 24. Benea the stands, there were holding rooms, medical centre, massage room, information offices, display boards, media centre, accreditation desk, officials registration, shops, and much more. Outside there

against a techno-lighting display

were about 50 shops, bars, stage for evening entertainment, camel rides and more.

The West Australians: John Gilmour has been battling injury for the last three years. He seemed to have the cross country won when a Japanese rushed past him to win by half a second. John had to withdraw from the 10 000m track after a few laps. He is now optimistic that he can resume training.

Barbara Atkinson was all smiles after PBs in placing seventh in the 5 000 and 10 000m walks. Norm Richards qualified in his heat of the 100m, then eased off in the semi, mistaking an aerial for the finishing post, missed a place in the final. To continue his frustration. became ill and was off work and five kilos lighter. David Clive had a brilliant 100m heat win, 12.57, qualified in the semi and ran fourth in the final. qualified in the 200m, withdrew with an injury but came back to earn a medal in the relay.

Bob Sammells was 28th in the cross country then ran the 1500m in 5:31, which was 14 seconds inside his target.

Eric Mercer, much travelled athlete, was inhibited in the 800 and steeple by an Achilles problem.

John Molloy, helped to the start line by last minute medical treament, finished brilliantly for a silver medal in the 400 hurdles.

Gary Clark put in solid performances in the 5000 and steeple.

Diane York, sprints and horizontal jumps, had her best performance in the triple, 8.80m for 8th place.

Patricia Carr celebrated her new age group with four medals, including gold in the triple, 7.89m.

David Carr made it a double with a win in the 1500m.

Lynne Choate, at the top of her age group, faced stiff competition. She made the final of 100m and 200m. Her reward came with a medal in the relay.

Professor Felix Crus-sanchez said people whose minds were highly stimulated showed slower progression of degenerative diseases. People were living longer because of advances in the prevention of heart disease, cancer and respiratory problems. As a result, the incidence of diseases such as Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia was increasing.

People whose brains were highly stimulated, with neurons sending lots of messages to each other, were less susceptible to brain disease and deterioration.

"Crosswords are very good," he said. "Learning languages, you must read, speak with other people. The important thing in ageing is isolation. You must not be isolated, you need to have activity with other people because we need to have many connections, one neuron with another." -Jenny Barnes
