supported a Vetrun drive to raise awareness of the deadly threat of skin cancer awareness. He wrote:

"It took me a while to get thoughts together but I do not mind sharing this information.

"Firstly, I was diagnosed with a particularly aggressive melanoma behind the knee.

"An area of skin measuring 12x12cm was removed and replaced with my own. Cancer had found its way elsewhere in the body.

"Subsequent immunology has upset the skin on legs.

"It's too early to know what the cancer is doing."

Typically, David then faced the inevitable with determination to achieve more, and more.

Lesser mortals would rest on their laurels after a career of world-beating performances. But a champion doesn't rest.

Entering his final decade of life he worked harder than ever, fighting debilitating medical treatment, and as is well-recorded, establishing several new world track records.

Like many ordinary people I was lucky enough to benefit from knowing David Carr. I was



privileged to be able, occasionally, to run alongside him. Though twelve years separated us, for a

few years, David, Brian Foley and I were contemporaries. In such company I thrived because that is the effect of sporting company. The less able raise their game with encouragement of the talented.

The founders

Almost 50 years ago David and a few peers founded our club. Their legacy are the hundreds, perhaps thousands, of fitter, healthier people who have been able to savour club camaraderie and friendship

David Carr was, I believe, the last of our WA veteran pioneers to compete at international level. The manner in which he did so was superlative, possibly unique. With his world records came acknowledgement that this man in his nineties was the world's best senior athlete.

So I revert to my Shakespearian headline.

For all his remarkable athletic achievements, it will be David's ending that will remain with me forever. At our last meeting he told me, unemotionally as ever, that he had but a few weeks to live. No self-pity. Forthright, quietly spoken. Wry humour as always.

DAVID Carr - as an M90 now holds the WR for 1,500m, 3,000m, 5,000m and 10,000m.

In the 800m, his favourite event, David still holds the M85 WR.

(Previously he set the M75 WR, which has now been broken.)

Mile

He also holds the M90 WR, and previously held it as an M80 and M85, both now broken.

2,000m Steeple

David holds the M90 WR - and also the WR for M80 and 85; both are still current.

MARK Hewitt, who co-ordinated the results for the Jorgensen cross-country championships, also heaped praise on his help-team.

"Today was an interesting test of the results software – introduced by Mark Kerr, and further developed by John Ranger.

"After an 8am start, the last finisher was recorded at the finish just before 9.15am.

"Multiple results, including all winners and placegetters, were available for announcement and in the community centre by 9.40am, where the medals were then presented by Rochelle Airey and Gillian Young.

Perfect couple?

"It worked so well and quickly because:

- The times and placings were recorded flawlessly (by a husband and wife team who clearly talk to each other!):
- The scanning by Rochelle Airey was flawless:
- There was no need to view the camera footage to correct errors;
- The software worked as developed.

"They have set a high bar, and with fingers crossed, I'd like to think we'll do it again next year!"

Where are they now?

WE are still searching, but this is where some of them were in 1980.

The event was a 16,000m – the old ten-miler – in WA, organised by the State Athletics Association at what is now Curtin University (and was then known as W.A.I.T. – Western Australian Institute of Technology).

Thanks to Jim Barnes for providing the full results, from which we are showing here those who were, or became, Masters (WAVAC) members.

An exception is the bloke who won the race, on May 10, 1980. That was Rob De Castella. But, fifth in was Jim Langford, with a time of 51:03. (De Castella ran 47:19.6.)







The 2023 result was solid. I can report a deficit of \$2,259 for the year. Cash on hand sits at \$84,356 which is still an extremely healthy state for a club of our size.

Revenue

Revenue continues to be strong as a result of a strong membership base. Visitor numbers were steady. Membership as at 30 June was 641. We received an extremely generous donation of \$5,000 from a member who wishes to remain anonymous.

Expenses

As mentioned in last year's report, Athletics West were slow in charging their annual fee and as such \$6,830 of the State Affiliation Fees of \$22,598 relates to 2022.

There were no other large items of expenditure of note and any replacement equipment was of minimal cost.

Events

As per previous reports any club events are expected to return a break-even result or better and this remains our policy.

The social weekends away also included a deposit payment for 2024.

State Championships were successfully held in March and returned a small but not unexpected deficit but within range of our targeted break-even position. Both marquee hire – \$1,547; and PA aystem – \$883, contributed to the deficit but greatly improved the comfort and experience for all.

Clothing

With the new club logo and a change of suppliers we will also have a new order policy. This will ensure a more cost-efficient system because the club no longer has to pay for and hold clothing stocks awaiting purchase by members.

Summary of Receipts and Payments

The summary has been included in the *Vetrun* and will also be placed on the website. As yet the accounts have not been audited.

Conclusion

Our sound financial position should ensure that the club continues to grow and function effectively for the benefit of all members for the foreseeable future.

OUR membership reached 636 at the end of May. This represents a fall of around 50 compared to last year, with no clear reason. John Fisher has introduced an initiative whereby we reach out to other running clubs in Perth and invite them to join us in 'Friendship' runs where we do not charge a visitor fee. These have been very popular and our hope is that some of these over-30 runners will join our club.

Achievements

In the past year MAWA members were recognised for outstanding contributions to Local, National and International Masters Athletics:

- David Carr was named World Masters Male Athlete of the Year.
- John Dennehy received a Merit Award for outstanding service to athletics in WA.
- Lynne Schickert was confirmed in her role as WMA Executive Vice President.
- AMA awards were given to David Carr, Mandy Mason, Barbara Blurton and Richard Blurton.

Increases

Registration of MAWA athletes with Athletics West increased from \$10 to \$15, while registration with AMA increased from \$7 to \$10. This left us with no choice

but to increase our membership fees by \$10.

We rolled out a new club logo, for which we received numerous favourable comments. We also changed our uniform supplier and the mechanism by which members will place orders.

This means the club will no longer need to carry stock – with our cost savings being passed to members through lower uniform prices. We also gave the website a facelift, with a more modern look without changing the functionality.

Co-operation with Athletics West continued to be very good. The new registration arrangements worked smoothly again while we were again well represented at the three 'all- ages' State Championships (multi-events, cross country and 20km walk).

Helpers

This has been the second year for the system of online registration for helper duties, but this year we put all dates up from day one. We like the low drop-out rate and the flexibility it gives members, but again we have found that we have to put a lot of work into sending out specific reminder emails.

Nothing much changed for our elite road runners with Clare Wardle, Roberto Busi, Gillian Young and Paul Watson all retaining their trophies.

On the track we re-started Tuesday evenings after completion of the WAAS re-surface in January, while attendance at ECAC was strong all season.

Thirty of our athletes travelled to the Nationals, held for the first time at Olympic Park in Homebush. Leading the gold medal charge was Sue Coate, who won medals in no less than 13 events – including five gold and a pentathlon Australian record.

To no-one's surprise Club Secretary Gillian Young bettered her own mark by some 13 seconds to set a new W75 Steeplechase World record of 11:01.5. And a second MAWA World Record went to Sharon Davis in the 4 x 800m relay. Our men could not quite match these dizzy heights.

David Carr was, of course, a stalwart. He won everything he entered in the M90 group but was not in the World Record form that saw him become World Masters Athlete of the year in 2022. Morland Smith also bagged a bunch of golds in the M85 – a great am-

bassador for the sport putting in top rate performances despite his sight impairment.

In the M70 Michael Byrne excelled with a gold and two silvers in the sprints and middle distance. Walk golds went to Karyn Tolardo, John McDonagh and Victor Munoz, while throwers Bev Hamilton and Ossi Igel both won three golds.

6 to run

Six of our athletes made the long trip to Torun in Poland for the World Indoors, achieving numerous State and Australian Indoor Records. Full listing is on the club website.

State Champs

Once again our State Championships were a thoroughly enjoyable event with the threatened bad weather holding off. We were slightly down on numbers but not on performance quality, with dazzling Australian records for sprinters Mandy Mason and Adrian McKenzie, plus an Australian pentathlon record for Sue Coate. Mandy took the 60m record from multi-world record holder Julie Brims and in so doing earned the Athlete of the Meet trophy.
